Alexander Campbell from Sydney, Austrailia, has started a four-year hike around the world. Why is he doing this, you might ask. The 27-year-old, also known as Zan, really likes walking. And this treck across 30 countries in four continents will help to earn donashions for the Fred Hollows Foundation. That organization helps to prevent vision problems, including blindness, around the world. Asia is one of the continents Campbell will cross while walking. That continent has the most blind people in the world and definitly appreciates the help of a group like the Fred Hollows Foundation.

Campbell started his 40,000 km walk in Febuary. As an experiensed hiker, he is unlikely to get sore legs or many blisters on his feet. In the past, he walked the primitive and challengeing Great Himalaya Trail in Nepal and the strenuous Colorado Trail in the US.

On his currant walk around the world, Campbell walks about 40-50 km per day. He then sets up camp for the night. The idea is to complete his trek within four years. That could change if weather conditions interfear or if he gets hurt or too tired. The plan for getting from one continent to the next is still somewhat uncertain. Campbell says he would rather take boats than airoplanes.

The Good Friday Agreement (also known as the Belfast Agreement) was signed on April 10, 1998. It brought an end to almost thirty years of violence between Republicans and Loyalists in Northern Ireland. Nationalist leader John Hume and Unionist leader David Trimble were jointly awarded the Nobel Peace Prize for 1998 for the work they did to get the agreement across the line.
