

Taoiseach Barred (Page 4)

Taoiseach Micheál Martin had a small grin on his face in the Dáil when it was reveeled to him that he had been barred from entering Russia because of Ireland's support of Ukraine.

He was not the only one targetted. Russia barred entry to 52 Irish offisials, including Tánaiste Leo Varadkar. This was in responce to western sanctions on Russia over the conflict in Ukraine. A statement said: 'Acting under orders from Brussels, Ireland is conducting an aggresive anti-Russian propaganda campain.'

The Taoiseach had something to say himself about propaganda. He said the bands were part of the 'propaganda war waged by Russia'. He added: 'We all have to stand together across Europe on this.'

On his own banning, he said: 'I don't think I've ever been sancshioned before.' He sounded a little amused by this.

However, he said that the Government will call in the Russian Ambasador to give him the official response to the sanctions 'in no uncertain terms.'

Minister for Foreign Affairs Simon Coveney, also barred, said: 'Ireland will make no apolagy for being on the right side of history.'

Burp! (Page 7)

Methane is a greenhouse gas that adds to climate change by traping heat in our atmosfere. This gas is produced from human activities but also by several natural prosesses, such as decaying plants and even by cows digesting their food. That's right ... cow-burps cause the releese of methane into the air!


But what's to be done about that? Cows have to eat! Scientists in New Zealand have been working on ways to reduce methane by controling cow-burping. Their plan involves a probiotic named Kowbucha. The powder is mixed with liquid and fed to calfes along with their regalur food. So far, researchers say the methane produced through burping is down by about 20%.

They hope to be selling the product in stores by 2024. By 2025, New Zealand will be fineing farmers whose animals give off too much methane. So, it's in everyone's best intrest to make plans like Kowbucha work. Similar products are being tested in other countries for lower methane emissions from cows. In order not to affect the milk produced, probiotics are the top choice because they are natural and good for cows. Scientists are also looking for low-cost options to avoid placing an extra burdon on farmers.

Jurnalist Alex Meehan recently visited a very special place in Dublin: the Sikh temple in Sandymount where every Tuesday and Sunday the Sikh comunity feeds anyone who turns up and hunderds of people are served at a time. He had met some Sikh men at a supermarket, pushing trollies loaded down with frozen peas and litres of milk. 'This is for the langar – the free meals at the gurdwara,' one of them explained. (A gurdwara is a Sikh temple.) So, he went to check it out.

He found a peaceful prayer room and a kitchen that was 'a hive of activity' where voluntears were pealing and chopping massive amounts of vegatebles, making hundreds of chapatis (flatbread) at high speed, and filling pots so big it took two peopel to lift them. All the food was paid for by the community.

The first guru of the religon, Guru Nanak, offered free meals to everyone who visited him, regardless of their caste (level in society), gender or welth. Both emperor and servant got the same meal. The 2,000 Sikhs in Ireland keep up this amazing and caring tradition.


