A Coin for Luke (Page 4)

A €15 silver commemorative coin of folke singer Luke Kelly sold out just one hour after going on sale. The issue was limeted to 3,000 coins, with a limit of one coin per sale. Those 3,000 people each bought a coin at the official price of €64.99 – but now fans and collectors who missed out are scrambleing to buy coins online for hundreds of euros each!

Luke Kelly was a founding member of the much-loved folk band The Dubliners. His coin features his instruement, the banjo, along with masks representing comedy and tradgedy – Luke sang both comic and tragic songs as well as ones with political messiges. He died in 1984 at the early age of 43 but the band didn't retire until 2012, after 50 years of performing.

The coin is the final one in the 'Modern Musician's series which has also featured guitar great Rory Gallagher and legandery rock musician Phil Lynott. It was launched by President Michael D. Higgins at St Laurence O'Toole's National School, Dublin, which Luke went to as a boy. Luke's brother Paddy attended the launch, singing 'The Rare Auld Times' with the school quire.

No Refugees This Time (Page 5)

Ukrainian Luba Healy, who lives in Trim, County Meath, is making a second humanitarian trip to Ukraine. Last time she brought her mother Nina (70), her grandmother Galina (99) and six other Ukrainians back with her, but this time there wont be any reskues – except for her mother's cat, which got fritened and ran off when they were leaveing Ukraine last time!

Luba says: 'Irish peeple will give anything they have to help Ukraine. But, at the moment, it's not good for anyone – the refugees or the Irish themselves – to be bringing people into a country where acommodation can't be promised. Ireland continues to do all it can, but it's a small country that can only do so much.'

Luba's Irish husband Eugene will go too, along with her son Frank (13) and five local volunteers. They will drive six vehicles filled with supplies to the Ukraine/ Poland border where they will meet a man from Luba's home village. He will distribute the cargo, including the vehicles (which Luba fundrased for), and deliver the six-year-old cat – who is crying for Luba's mam all the time, the neighbours say. The group will then fly home.

Inspiring Mann (Page 7)

The first Native American woman in space recently blasted off in a NASA launch from Florida. Marine Cornel Nicole Mann is the comander on the SpaceX rocket travelling to the Internashional Space Station for a six-month stay. She is a member of the Wailacki of the Round Valley Indian Tribes in California. On this mission, she carrys some personal items, such as photographs, her wedding ring, and a dreamcatcher.

As a Marine, Colonel Mann gained plenty of flying experiense and has been awarded many medals for her servise. She completed her astronaut training in 2015. In 2017, just 27% of Native Americans earned third-level education degrees, as compared to 54% of white college students. Colonel Mann, who holds a Bachelor's and a Master's degree in meckanical engineering, hopes this space mission will inspire other Native Americans to reach their potenshal and fulfill their dreams.

The team on this mission plans to carry out 250 scientific experiments. They hope to grow tomatos in space, 3D-print human cells, and go on space walks. The crew includes another American, an astronaut from Japan, and a Russian cosmonaut. They are switching places with another crew of four astronauts, who will then return to earth.

In 2016, the most powerful earthquake to hit Italy in 36 years, registering 6.6 on the Richter scale, left over 15,000 _____ (1) homeless. This was the third quake in the region in three months, and _____ (2), there were no lives lost.

The epicentre of the tremor was close to the town of Norcia, which has a _____ (3) of around 5,000 people. The 14th century Basilica of St Benedict in Norcia and the nearby Abbey of Sant-Eutizio, dating back to the 5th century, were among the many _____ (4) destroyed.

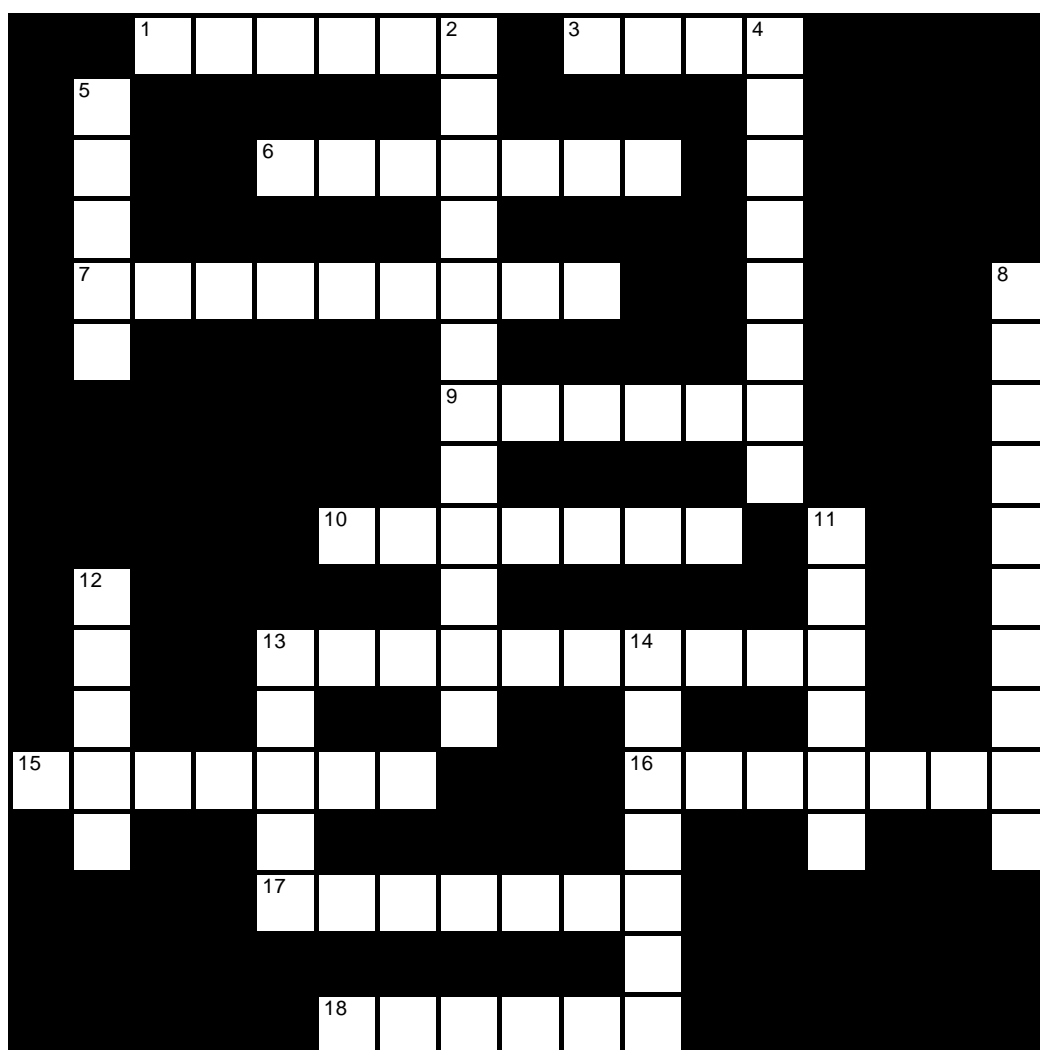
