Another Courtmacsherry Rescue (Page 5)

The Courtmacsherry RNLI all-weather lifeboat has done it again, with another dramatick rescue to add to its long list. It was called out on September 3 by the Coastguard Marine Rescue, to go to the aid of a 20ft pleazure boat with a fire on board. The boat was about a kilometer offshore in Clonakilty Bay.

Within 10 minutes of geting the call, the six-person RNLI crew, led by coxswain Seán O'Farrell, were speedin towards the stricken boat. The Inshore Community Lifeboat at Inchydoney, with two crew memburs on board, also rushed to the rescue.

The electrical fire was quickly exthinguished, but the boat's engene was damaged. The 'Courtmac' crew then toed the boat ashore, while the Inshore lifeboat took the casualty boat's two crew members to safety.

Courtmacsherry Lifeboat operations manager Brian O'Dwyer said: 'It was great to see the cooperation of all the rescue agencies in today's important callout as minutes matters when a fire ocurrs on board any vessel.'

Have Your Say (Pages 4 and 5)

There's a chance Irish towns could be darker and gloomyer this Christmas as businesses struggel to pay their electricity bills. Shop owenrs say energy bills have dubled or even trebled and they will struggle to put up the usual lavish Christmas decorations.

In fact, leaving the lights off in shop windows after closeing time is one of the things shops may have to do, ackording to Retail Excellence Ireland managing director Duncan Graham. 'The cost of electricity could result in some closures of stores that were teetering on the brink during Covid,' he says. 'Especially now that custamers will have less money to spend.'

Companies also fear possible winter electricity blackouts, which would interfear with production. Some companies will be produceing as much as possible now in September fearing rising costs and outages. Others are buying diesel generators − each costing as much as €100,000 − because of possible outages.

Let's just hope that all this is alarmist or just a worst-case scenario. No-one wants a less than bright Christmas.
