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The Writing Corner

March Short Story Theme:

A Lesson Learned

In this month's Writing Corner, we have chosen the theme of 'learning a lesson'. This could be a lesson that you did not expect to learn, it could be a costly lesson, or it could be a lesson that was unexpected but badly needed.

Top tips on writing by bestselling author Helena Duggan

1. When you're first sitting down to write your story, forget about beautiful sentences or elaborate words – just write it as it comes. Allow the story to flow from your head onto the page without judgement and see where it takes you. Let your imagination free.
2. Don't reread the full story until you've gotten to the end, otherwise you might never finish. You see, if you're like me (and 99% of the population), when you go back over what you've written you may think it's terrible and you might give up. So don't do it. Wait until the story is finished and then go back with a clear head.
3. Everybody's first attempt is terrible, that's why it takes a million attempts to write a book. That's where editing comes in. I'll let you in on a secret – at first, I hated editing. I had to teach myself to appreciate it which eventually grew to liking it ... 'ish'. But editing is what brings your story together – it polishes the plotlines and makes the words sing.
4. Believe in yourself. Stop doubting. You can do it and you are good. Remember what you are writing is your world and so it can be anything you want it to be. Stop worrying about what anyone else thinks and just enjoy the story.
5. Never give up! If I was to give only one piece of advice, that would be it. It's simple, if you never give up you'll write that story, or climb that mountain, or do whatever it is you want to do. Too many people convince themselves they can't and so they don't. Tell yourself you can – and you will!

Mending a Hole in the Sky (Page 6)

A layer of the gas called 'ozone' in the Earth's atmosphere protects us from harmful radiation. That radiation can cause bad things like skin cancer and damage to crops. In the 1980s, scientists noticed that this protective layer of ozone was growing thinner. The layer finally became so thin in Antarctica that it develops a hole going straight through it each year!

Since the thinning of the ozone layer was discovered, all nations agreed in 1987 to stop making chemicals that are known to eat into the ozone layer. These were used mainly in aerosol sprays and refrigerants. Scientists came up with cleaner, safer chemicals to replace them.

About 35 years later, the United Nations now reports the ozone layer is slowly healing. If all efforts continue, the ozone should return to its normal level by 2040. In the Arctic, this will take until 2045. In Antarctica, where it's super thin, the full fix should be complete by 2066.

This is news for all of us to celebrate. It's a huge step in the right direction for climate action and toward saving millions of people each year from skin cancer.

Help Now Pours into Pakistan (Page 7)

At least 1,700 people died last year in Pakistan's terrible floods, and about 8 million others had to leave their homes to survive. As well as all this, a great deal of the country's infrastructure – like roads, bridges, transportation and communication – was destroyed.

Even before this climate disaster, Pakistan was a country with a struggling economy. That meant the flooding hit even harder than it might have in another country.

After the United Nations asked for assistance, countries around the world have been pitching in to help Pakistan rebuild. Saudi Arabia, the World Bank, and the Islamic Development Bank were big donors. In addition, the US, the European Union, France and China also contributed. Donations of €4.7 billion have already been promised. That is about half the amount needed for the country to recover.

Pakistan is still waiting for approval of more money from the International Monetary Fund. Meanwhile, businesses try to save electricity by closing early. At a recent United Nations climate conference, the Minister of State for Foreign Affairs from Pakistan said she is feeling very hopeful because of all the help from around the world.

Good news! Ireland has scored high on the list of the best countrys in which to raise a family. It was ranked 19th out of the 195 countries in the world.

The list was compiled by global travel sight Big 7 Travel and car-comparison specialists EnjoyTravel. They used a points sistem, based on Safety, Healthcare, Salery, Rent, Education, and maternity and paternity leave after a baby is born. This total maximom score was 150. Ireland scored 106 points. Norway, the winner, scored 129.

The surveyors said: 'Safe and family-friendly, it's little wunder why Ireland ranks as one of the best countries in the world to rase a family.'

Palmyra is about 250 kilometres northeast of the Syrian _____ (1), Damascus. It was given the name Palmyra, meaning 'city of palm trees,' by the Romans, who attacked and _____ (2) it in AD 130. Travellers are often astounded that such an important site is situated in the middle of the Syrian Desert, half-way between the Mediterranean coast and the River Euphrates.
